



Folly Heads Toward Elections

The Mayor's chair and three Council seats will be filled by voters in the 2018 municipal election Tuesday, April 3rd. Candidates for these offices are profiled beginning on page 3.

Here are some things you need to know about the election:

- Mayor Goodwin is the **only candidate for Mayor**.
- Incumbent Council members Pennell Clamp and Dale Stuckey are not running for re-election. DJ Rich is the **only incumbent Council member** on the ballot.
- You can vote for one, two, or three Council candidates. If you vote for fewer than three, the **machine will prompt you** to vote for more candidates, but you do not have to do so.
- There is an opportunity to write in a candidate for each position. To do so, select the write-in slot for the position. An electronic keyboard will appear on the screen, and you can type in the name of the person you want to vote for.
- **Voting will take place** from 7 am to 7 pm at the Baptist Fellowship Hall, Center and West Indian.
- About 100 Folly Beach voters live on and off the Causeway and **vote in James Island precincts**, usually at James Island Elementary. For the Folly Beach election, they will vote at the Baptist Fellowship Hall. The James Island Elementary polling place will not be open.
- There is still time to **register to vote** in the Folly election, but you must do so by March 3rd. Marlene Estridge, the City Clerk, has forms and can register you. If you mail your registration, it must be postmarked by March 3rd.
- You can vote **absentee by mail** in this election. Call the County Board of Elections at 843-744-VOTE (8683) to get an absentee ballot application. When you complete and return it, a ballot will be sent to you. If you want to vote absentee in every election this year, check the box at the top of the application, and ballots will be sent to you. Make sure to get someone to sign the return envelope (after it's sealed) as a witness.
- You can vote **absentee in person** starting March 5th by going to the County Board of Elections at 4367 Headquarters Road in North Charleston, Monday-Friday, 8:30 am – 5 pm. It takes about 10 minutes to complete an absentee ballot application and vote on a machine.
- Doors to the polling place will close at 7 pm, but anyone in line at that time can still vote. Once the polls have shut

down, voters will be **readmitted to watch the count** and hear the preliminary result,

EASTER ON FOLLY

He selected the lot for the abundance of oak trees on a slight bluff. A retaining wall was built on the left to protect them.

Confederate jasmine blankets the front bed to avoid soil loss. Wooden steps lead to a boardwalk to the front entrance. Fan palms, God-given, waft in both front beds. Red nandina accents the walkway. A large oleander and grasses stand to the right with encore azaleas.

A slate border separates the front beds from an expanse of Saint Augustine grass. The left bed provides society garlic, which keeps mosquitoes at bay, along with pink and white azaleas, one a gift to her husband, culminating with roses.

Symmetrical beds grace the front of her home. On either side tulip trees herald the coming of spring. Sasanqua red camellias, oleanders and encore azaleas maintain the balance.

Annette enjoys how her garden looks when a project is completed, and is most appreciative of help from her daughter and grandchildren. Folly for her is the generational

Get to Know Candidates Before You Vote April 3rd

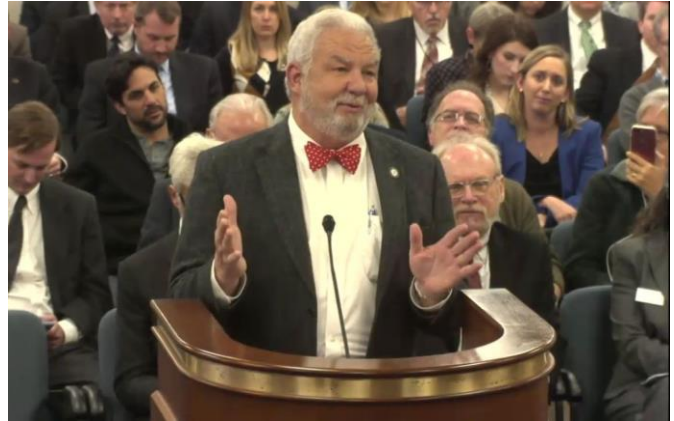
Candidate for Mayor: Tim Goodwin

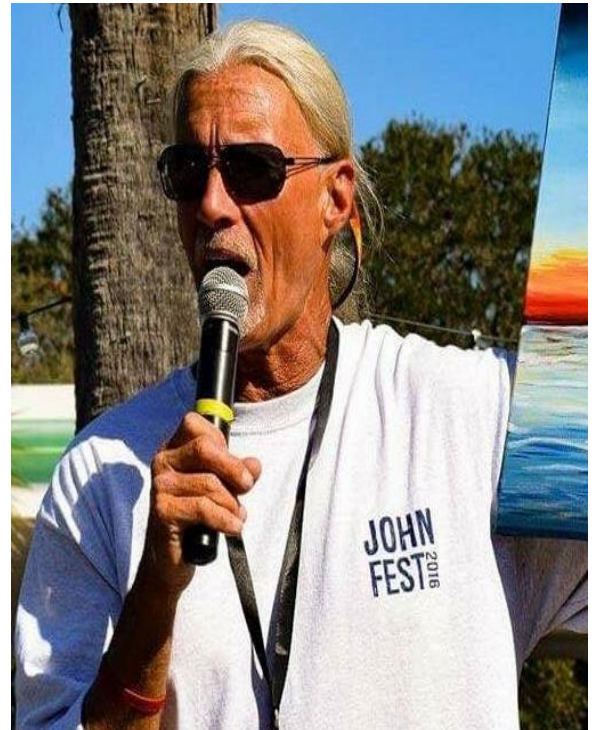
Council Candidate Roger Rutledge

From the Desk of the Mayor

March is here, and Easter is right around the corner. That means we should be preparing for the influx of visitors that begins this time of year. As the days warm up, parking will be at a premium and the beach will see umbrellas begin to spring up like the mushrooms in our yards. The only difference is, this year I suspect the West end of the beach will experience more visitors than the East end with all the work taking place on the East end of the Island.

The groin rehabilitation and beach nourishment projects will begin to mobilize this month and probably continue into August, with about 500 yards of beach at a time off limits to beach visitors. While the City recognizes the inconvenience, we hope everyone will work with the city and contractors to make this as easy a transition as possible.

Beach nourishment is on everyone's radar, but let's not lose sight of other items happening around the city. The Public Works department continues to work with Charleston County Storm Water Division and the State Department of Transportation to refine and improve the city's storm water drainage. The city completed several projects last year, but there are more in the planning into next year and beyond.

The Utilities department has completed GIS mapping the water system and is now making plans to replace the infrastructure as needed. This has been an ongoing project for the last couple of years and it will be an ongoing project for years to come. The funds for this infrastructure rehabilitation are taken from the utilities budget and not the General Fund Budget.

The City is also continuing to work on pedestrian paths to give our visitors a safer place to walk about in the Commercial district and side streets leading to and from the condos on West Ashley and East Ashley to second street. The Staff also continues to work on ways to communicate with all residents, if you have any ideas all are welcomed and maybe the answer will be born from the discussion.

It's also time to pick up parking passes for this year, along with your 2018 registration for golf carts and new dog tags if you have a dog as your pet (or as mine are, your boss). One thing to be said for the golf cart registration beside the parking is the help in identification. These registration numbers and information have helped to recover a couple of golf carts that

had been stolen and taken off the island. The dog tags are very useful if your dog escapes and is picked up by Public Safety, to help them find their way back home.

Don't depend on rumors or social media to get your (incorrect) information. You know the old saying, "If you haven't heard a rumor on Folly by 9 am, start one." Instead, reach me at (843) 729-0298 or tgoodwin@cityoffollybeach.com.
